Attributes of Open Pedagogy

- **flexible and innovative:** finding digital technologies and new methods of teaching that encourage students to share knowledge and resources;
- **community building:** peers share willingly within a connected, trusting, and collegial community;
- **student-centered:** students take ownership over artifacts that they create and share;
- **reflective practice:** students and teachers interrogate tools and practices that mediate learning, knowledge building, and sharing;

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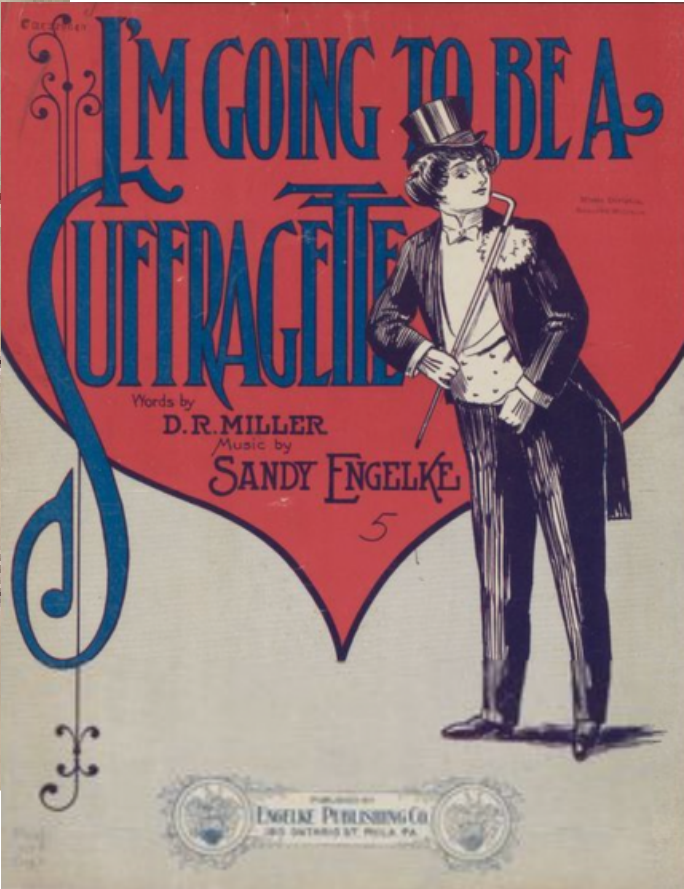

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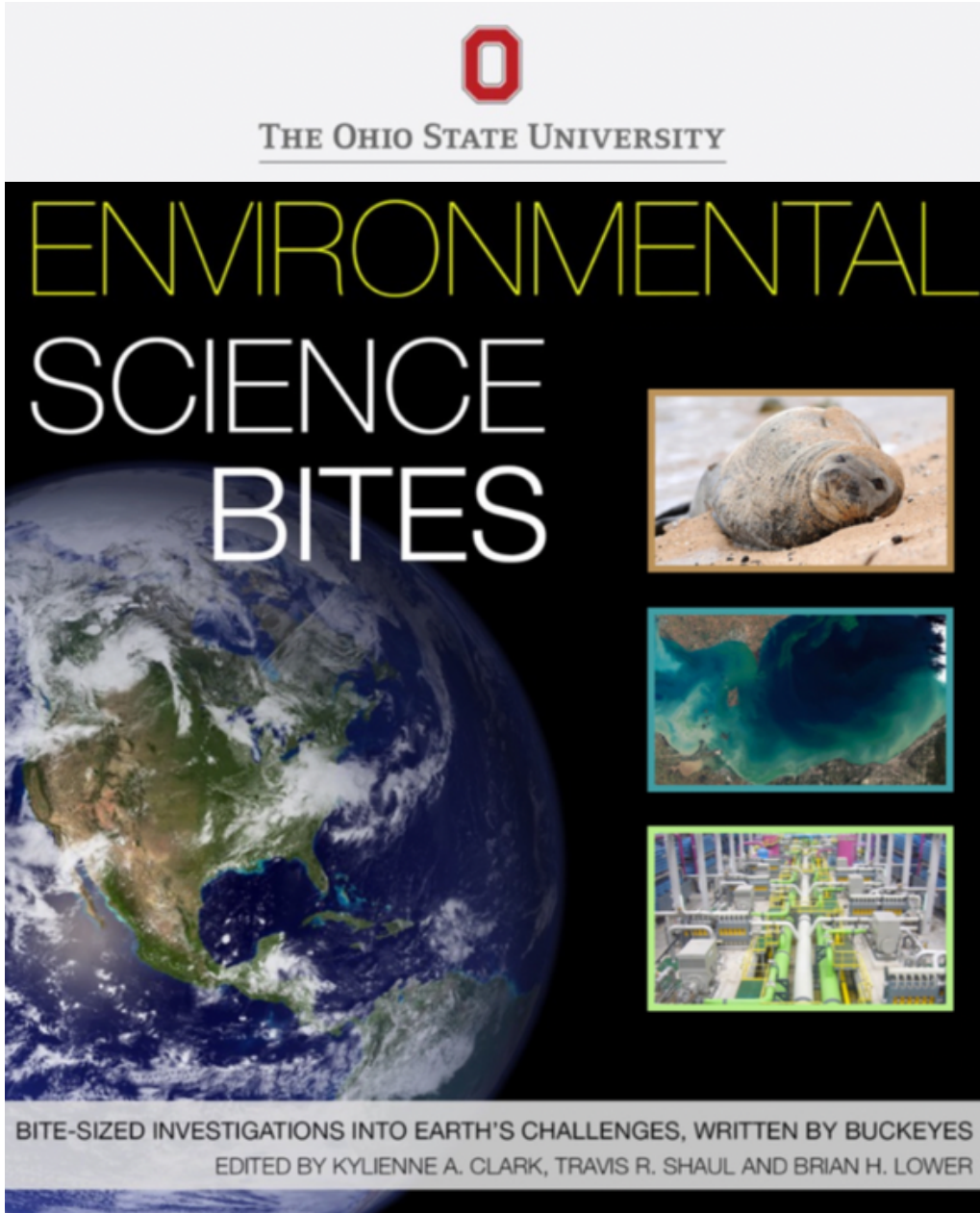
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4.3 Proper Management of Phosphorus for Future Food Security

- Foster conversations around equity & access

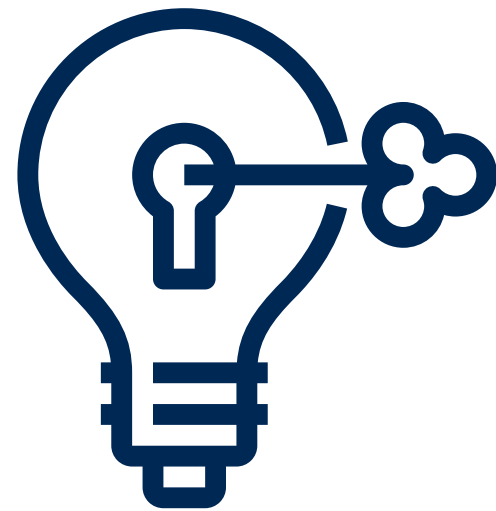


Best Practices
